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
Welcome to Scaremount!


FAIRMOUNT COMMUNITY GARDEN

Explore History with the Fort Worth Public Library!

Did you know that the Fort Worth Public Library has a unit dedicated to preserving and helping people access historical information? Now you know! The Genealogy, Local History, and Archives (GLHA) unit is currently located in the Central Library at 500 West Third Street in downtown. We are currently only available by appointment or virtually, because changes are a-comin'!

If you haven't already heard, the Seminary branch of the Fort Worth Public Library will be moving into a new space in La Gran Plaza soon. After the current Seminary building is vacated, the GLHA unit will move in. We are looking forward to having a parking lot to make things more convenient for researchers. The Genealogy, Local History and Archives unit is the official municipal archives of the City of Fort Worth. When City departments have records they no longer use for business purposes, an archivist evaluates them for possible transfer to the municipal archives. Although some records are legally required to remain permanently in the department that created them, many others are transferred to us. The Development Department is one of our most frequent contributors. One of their most recent records transfers to us contains a lot of records from the Office of Historic Preservation.

In addition to the municipal records, the Archives also has collections that document local

individuals, families, businesses, clubs, churches, and other organizations. We also have a large collection of photographs of people and places around Fort Worth—you can browse the Historic Photograph Collection in our digital archives at https://fwpl.info/photo-archive.

The photographs have been donated to the Fort Worth Public Library Archives by individuals and organizations throughout the last 70+ years, and mostly date from late-1800s and early to mid-1900s. It's important to note that because of the way the collection was amassed, it is hit-and-miss as to whether or not the Archives has a photograph of a house or building at a specific address. Our Local History collection has city directories that date from 1877-2016. The city directories are a great tool for learning about the history of the people who lived in the city. The data in the books is arranged by name and also by address (recent years are only by address or telephone number), and the older directories also provide statistical information for the city and categorically arranged information about a variety of businesses, schools, churches, and other institutions.

We also have an extensive school year book collection where you might find a photo of a student or teacher who once lived in your house once you find their name in the city directory. The Local History Collection also has books about Fort Worth businesses,

industries, clubs, churches, neighborhoods, and people.

We have Texas's third-largest collection of books of genealogical information, which focuses on the Atlantic states and those in the common migration pattern to Texas, but also includes books on genealogy covering every state in the United States, and several countries. Any of the staff can assist you with genealogy questions, but if you're really stuck, our Genealogy Specialist Librarian Suzanne Fritz can help you get un-stuck.

The Fort Worth Public Library also offers access to several genealogy and history databases. Some of these require a library card for access (if you don't already have a card, you can apply for an e-card online https://fwpl.info/ card). One of our most popular databases for genealogy and local history research is Ancestry Library Edition. It is normally only available in a FWPL location (you can use your device or one of our public PCs), but due to COVID the folks at Ancestry.com have graciously permitted libraries to temporarily allow remote access through December 31, 2021. Library cardholders have access to Newsbank's Fort Worth Star-Telegram database, too! If you need help with search strategies for any of the Library's databases, vou can reach GLHA staff at 817-392-7740 or genlhst@ fortworthtexas.gov. Due to the nature of our collections, items in the

Genealogy, Local History and Archives unit are not available to be checked out. Until we move to our new location, you can contact us using the information above to schedule a research appointment. Just let us know if there are specific titles or collections you need to use, or staff will discuss your research with you and make selections and have the items

ready for you at the time of your appointment.

Fun fact: in 1962, the Fort Worth Public Library Board explored the possibility of locating the Seminary branch library in the then-Seminary South Shopping Center instead the standalone building it ended up in. After deciding against a location in the

shopping center, the final note in the minutes indicated that they would remain open to a location in the shopping center in the future. The future is almost here!

The Joy of Medicare by Frances Look, "MissMedicare 101"

Check Up... Tune Up... See What's New

Let's open Pandora's Box! YIPEE!!! **NEW Medicare Advantage Plans** are coming out October 1st! Were you too Pandemic panicked to think about Medicare Plans last year? Or bought from that NFL TV star hawking Medicare programs on TV? Oops. Guess what-now you can CHANGE!

Your needs change- so can your Medicare plan. The insurance companies have been planning all year how to add new whiz, bangs, and whistles to win your business.

Medicare's annual election period ("AEP" in insure-speak) is when Medicare plan enrollees can reevaluate and make changes to their plan. You are not married to your Medicare Advantage plan. This enrollment period runs from October 15 to December 7 each year, and changes you make during that time are effective January 1. You might, in fact, have the best plan for you right now, many people do. It helps to check up your plan to be sure. And the tune up is no charge, usually by phone or ZOOM.

So just what can you do at this

Change from one Medicare Advantage plan to another Move out of MediGap/Medicare Supplement into Medicare Advantage Plan Switch from one Medicare Part D prescription drug plan to another Medicare part D plan Move from Original Medicare to Medicare Advantage Switch from Medicare Advantage to Original Medicare (plus a Medicare Part D plan, and possibly a Medigap plan)

Enroll in a Medicare Part D plan if you didn't enroll when you were first eligible. If you haven't maintained other creditable coverage, a late-enrollment penalty may apply. Just as a pop quiz, to enroll in Medicare Advantage, you must be enrolled in both Medicare Part A and Part B. Your Medicare Advantage plan replaces both parts and usually also includes Medicare Part D prescription drug coverage.

OK-wait for it. Here comes the tricky part. Ding Ding Ding-the annual enrollment period does NOT apply to Medigap/Medicare Supplement, I call these the "Alphabet Plans"- A, B, C, N, F, G, K, N. Another pop quiz to past articles! These plans can be changed any time during the year, BUT (caps intentional), unless in your original enrollment period or a "Special Election Period" you will have to go through that Big Bad Wolf called underwriting. So, call your agent after October 1st to see what is new, see if your old plan still "fits" or if there are any new whiz, bangs, and whistles. Good surprises may be in store for you.
