

Are You Recycling Right?

If you are going to the effort of separating recyclables into the recycling bin, you probably hope and expect that they will not end up in the landfill with the other trash. Unfortunately, when a load is contaminated with non-recyclables, much of it must be sent to the dump. One of the common mistakes is putting plastic bags in that bin. The way that the aluminum, glass, plastic and paper are sorted is by riding over a shaking conveyor belt. Filmy plastic, like shopping bags, get tangled up in the sorting process. That creates a lot of work for the staff at the sorting center as well as damage to the equipment. Fort Worth wants all our trash to be bagged, but NONE of



our recycling. Just put dry, fairly clean plastic (if it has a triangle stamped on it), paper, cardboard, aluminum, metal cans and glass into the recycling bin loose – no bagging! It is 2022 and time for plot renewals for the year! Plots are leased from February thru January. We supply the 4x8 plot, water, soil, mulch and compost for \$55 a year. We welcome all gardeners new and old for what we think will be an exciting year in 2022.

Some of our activities of 2021 that we will repeat in the coming year are our 2nd Saturday workdays, a very successful Easter Egg hunt, a plant, seed and tool swap that was set up by neighbors Bonnie Blackwell and Rachael Gollay, and a fall pumpkin display with a photographer available for family photos. Also our board members are planning even more events for this year. We also welcome suggestions from our neighbors. We decorated the garden for several occasions. Thanks to Board members and volunteers the garden looked great for the Holidays, Home tour and Fairmount's own Festivus celebration. Last year we had two short seminars by 2 of our gardeners. One was on proper composting by Dr. Chris Parker, a former board member, and the second one by Saraswathi Pandey on propagation of vegetables she grows that are common to her native Nepal. She grows turmeric and taro in her beds and she gave us a good understanding of how to propagate it and use it.

If you are a first time gardener we have lots of members who are happy to share their expertise and experiences in gardening in raised beds. We have plans to have more talks by volunteers to enhance our chances of improving our outcomes. There are many sites on the internet about gardening in Texas. Our state is so big and has so many different climate areas that you can find lots of advice for our particular area of Texas. It can be a challenge to garden in our area due to the unpredictable weather patterns. We have already had days of beautiful warm sunny days followed by Arctic cold fronts and temps in the teens. It can pay off though when you have a delicious salad from lettuce you grew, or a BLT with a home grown tomato and or you make a pesto with home grown basil. You might even get the kiddos to enjoy spinach if they grow it themselves.

If you're not ready to lease a plot and try your hand at growing something please come by and stroll through the garden and see what is happening. We have several plots that are open to the public to pick some samples of what we can grow here. Talk with the gardeners and just enjoy the atmosphere. We enjoy meeting our neighbors and answering questions about the Fairmount Community Garden. And we would like to invite you to volunteer or give a talk on some of your success with growing things

FIRE STATION PARK

Members of the Near Southside community gathered on January 12 to celebrate the construction kickoff of Dickie's Skate Plaza at Fire Station Park. The celebration included hot cocoa, beignets, and several remarks from community leaders. The expansion of the park is made possible by a generous donation from VF Foundation – the philanthropic arm of Dickies' parent company, VF Corp. – and Dickies, the Fort Worth-based global workwear brand. At least \$70k has also been raised through a grassroots effort led

by the local skate community. Construction will begin this year with plans for completion by the end of the year.

According to the Near Southside, Inc., Fire Station Park will feature an urban skate plaza for all skill levels, pump track for BMX bikes, market plaza for local vendors and other gatherings, central green for open play and public events, and fenced dog park for unleashed fun.

The Joys of Medicare

Should I use an agent or just call that 800 number? I know- that X-NFL Football player hawking insurance plans looks & sounds convincing. And all those goodies he offers! Soooo you dial.... hmmm, that just does not happen to fit "your case". But wait- they have a plan that does! Sound familiar? So, let's talk 800 numbers. First of all- it is an 800 number (or any of the new combo's for freebie numbers). How much luck have you had calling 800 number on bills or your accounts? Right! The agent probably will be knowledgeable, bubbly, and friendly but you will never get that same agent again. Usually only representing 1 company. My Grandad used to call those "One Trick Ponies". Then you have an issue with the policy or a claim or even getting your ID card.

Back to the 800 number with a gazillion transfers to some overseas person that sounds a gazillion miles away. Sometimes with a rooster crowing in the background. What are the advantages of using an independent agent? They are usually local and know your area hospitals, facilities and doctors. Choose an independent that has dealt with your friends, family, or financial adviser- if they like them, you probably will too.

Choice of carriers | Independent agents represent many different insurance companies that offer a wide variety of coverage options and prices, not just one company. They analyze your personal needs, find intersection of your current Doctor, Prescriptions, and Plans with any current or future needs. And, YES, you can change every year if in a Medicare Advantage Plan. (*But not a Medicare Supplement Plan!)

Licensed and trained experts | Independent agents can explain the complexities of insurance in simple terms, helping you make the best decisions. Insurance is a complicated subject. It is an agent's job to understand it and communicate so you understand it as well. Not in "insure-speak" and acronyms but plain English.

Continuing Education | It is MANDATORY and ongoing. Then it changes every year- for all independent agents.

Advocate for client | For questions on policy or claims, Agents have separate "agent channels" to get or resolve issues, not the endless loop 800 number purgatory a client can fall into. Much of an agent's job is the client service portion.



So- you can choose the 800 number on your TV or use an independent agent. What comes to mind is "Who ya gonna call?" Ooops- now the Ghostbusters theme song will be in your head all day.
