With the holiday season quickly approaching I wanted to share a few safety tips which are targeted toward the holiday season but many can be used every day of the year.

Shopping:

- Avoid wearing expensive jewelry while shopping.
- Park in a well-lit area and have your keys in hand prior to arriving at your vehicle.
- Be alert when walking in parking lots and parking garages
- Be aware of your surroundings and not looking down texting or talking on your phone.
- Try and always take a family member or a friend with you on all shopping trips.
- Avoid carrying large sums of cash and limit the number of credit cards on your person.
- Keep cash and credit cards in your front pants pocket.
- When placing items into your vehicle keep them out of sight such as in the trunk or under the cargo security shade in most SUV's and Cross Over

Home:

DON'T PLACE YOUR CHRISTMAS TREE IN FRONT OF A WINDOW.

Most of us like for everyone to know that we are in the Christmas spirit by putting our well lit tree in front of the biggest window facing the street with wrapped presents all around.

For a thief this is easy pickin's and makes their job so much easier. They will walk the streets looking for easy targets such as this, then lay in wait for you to leave. Sometimes we even see them sitting in their cars with binoculars peering into theses windows and listing what they see at each house.

- Draw your curtains and pull down your blinds to limit window shopping by thieves.
- Instruct parcel delivery services NOT TO LEAVE PACKAGES

ON YOUR PORCH but to contact the homeowner or leave the item with a neighbor.

- Tell your neighbors, COP members and NPO when you are leaving town.
- Stop your mail and paper service.
- Place lights on a timer so that it appears you are home at night.
- If you only have one vehicle ask your neighbor to park in your driveway.

Even if you are out of town you can call the Fort Worth police non-emergency number @ 817-335-4222 and request extra patrol because you are out of town.

Have your heater and fireplace checked before you really need to use them.

Christmas decorations:

- Water your Christmas tree.
- Inspect your lighting on the tree and all ornamental lighting.
- Don't overwhelm your electrical out-
- Last but not least, remember Santa likes cookies and milk and so does Mark Russell.


FALL INTO FALL WITH FIRE STATION COMMUNITY CENTER FALL FESTIVAL

OCTOBER Yard of the Month

moved to Fairmount just a few months ago, but wasted no time in putting their green thumbs to work. What less than a year ago was a grassless patch of dirt at 2236 College Avenue is now our October Yard of the Month.

If variety is the spice of life, then the Lawrences have created one spicy space. Their garden is a botanical feast for the eyes where it takes only a minute to spot dozens of plant varieties. Water conservation being an important consideration for the Lawrences, they tend to select drought tolerant plants and Texas native varieties.

These include several types of sage and ornamental grasses. They have also planted native hibiscus, Mexican petunia, rock rose, and turk's cap. In her cooking, Kimberly loves to use oregano, mint, and basil that grow just steps from her front door.

Oak-leaf hydrangea, bottle brush, American beauty berry, and shrimp plant are a few of the striking shrubs that can be seen. Perhaps a bit unexpected are the variegated ginger, eucalyptus, and umbrella plant. And there are many others too numerous to list here.

Kimberly is a social worker and Jeremy is a former TV engineer who now is a stay at home dad. He grew up in the Berkeley neighborhood, but the couple moved to Fairmount from the Sunset Heights area of Ft. Worth in March. They have four children: daughters Mayva, Ella, and Hannah, and son Haedan. "It was important to us to find a home with history and character," says Kimberly.

Their 1925 bungalow on College seems to fit the bill. The landscape itself has a bit of history. Most of the plants were transplanted from their former house. They also like to trade plants with their neighbors. If you can think of something the Lawrences do not already have growing in their yard, you might be able to work a deal and have your own piece of the Yard of the Month to take home for your landscape.

Congratulations to Jeremy and Kimberly for their home being selected. They have been awarded a gift certificate from C.C.'s Touch of Nature in recognition of their horticultural efforts.

The November Yard of the Month will be chosen based on Halloween decoration. So bring those scarecrows down from the attic. Dig those tombstones out of the garage. Fairmount Trap Neuter Return Program for feral cats

Fairmount has a Trap and Release Program to aid in trapping feral neighborhood cats, taking them to a vet where they can be spayed or neutered, and then returning them to the neighborhood. The program is funded by the neighborhood association. The FNA has budgeted money to pay for the spay/neuter and vaccinating and will reimburse the \$15 cost for having a feral cat spayed or neutered. A receipt from the Humane Society of North Texas must be submitted for reimbursement. Fairmount has a number of live-animal traps to loan to residents with stray or feral cats. Crepe Myrtle Scale

T Te love our Crepe Myrtles here in Texas. We love 'em 'cause they bloom so lushly and so long and we love 'em 'cause they're so easy to care for - at least they have been 'til now... walking down the side of my house recently, I was surprised to see my crepe myrtle look like

Now, I'm accustomed to giving my trees a stiff bath to rid them of aphids from time to time. Those nasty little critters create the sticky drippings on your driveway and cars.

But this is a new insect which seems to be related to the Azalea bark beetle and it leaves not only scaly white patches on the tree limbs but a sooty black mold. Although the pest has been in north Texas since 2005, we're just beginning to see it

Ugly as it is and ugly as it makes the tree look, it doesn't kill a healthy crepe

The most effective treatment so far at this time of year is to wash the branches with a mild solution of dishwashing soap and a soft brush.

This winter, when the tree is dormant use a fairly heavy treatment of dormant oil spray. (Neither of these is a long term solution and no low impact insecticide has been developed so far.)

In the spring, release ladybugs according to direction as the best weapon against the pests (see the attached picture).

Keep after them and you can still enjoy the bounty of your crepe myrtles.



Points to Ponder

Ithough many of our sidewalks still needing attention, the recent repaving of sections of 5th and 6th Avenue have added to Athe walkable sidewalks many of us enjoy on our daily walks. For those sidewalks, the only impediments now are those things which block the sidewalk: cars, branches from low growing trees and construction or demolition debris. In case you didn't know, Sec 22-178 of the City Code for Fort Worth expressly forbids parking across the sidewalk. And the Code Department considers low growing tree branches, shrubs and construction or demolition debris as a violation as well.

peaking of sidewalks, walking your dog at night or in the early morning when it's dark is not permission to leave his poop on Uthe sidewalk for someone else to step in. City ordinance states that you should pick it up; at the very least, carry something that can be used to shove it into the grass. And we all want to be good neighbors as much as we want to have good neighbors.

October's Faimount Social Was a Scream





Grandmother's Sugar Cookie

This is my mother's sugar cookie recipe. It is delicious-note the sweetened condensed milk which adds flavor and soft texture.

Step 1

Blend with your fingers:

3 cups flour

2 tsp. baking power

1 tsp. baking soda

1 tsp. salt

1 cup shortening

Blend with your fingers until all the ingredients are mixed. Do not over mix.

Yes--use your fingers--it's o.k. if you wash your hands first.

Step 2

Manually mix:

2 eggs

1 cup sugar

4 tsp. sweetened condensed milk

1 tsp. vanilla.

Step 3

Blend the dry ingredients with the flour mixture. Form into a small ball and wrap into plastic wrap. Let refrigerate for 24 hours.

24 hours later--divide dough into two small balls. Take 1/2 dough and roll out into about a 1/8 to 1/4 inch thick dough. Cut out shapes using your favorite cookie cutters. Bake 5 to 6 minutes at 375 degrees. Do not overbake.



Decorate cookies with frosting, sprinkles, & candies. Turn your kids loose and they will come up with great designs. This is a delicious cookie and fun to make.
