### FNA BOARD MEETING MINUTES

December 7, 2009-7:00 P.M

Attending: Robert, Patti, Fred, Sean, Chewy, Sue, David

### **Director Reports -**

**Robert** – thanked the Holiday party organizers for another success. Sue estimated about 80 attendees from tickets, and announced prize winners.

**Director of Infrastructure** – Sean – showed drawings of possible Fairmount monument-style markers for either end of Allen. Street lights will begin installation again in January. The City is requesting authorization from property owners, which has never been the case before, as the City is the property owner of the easement where they are installed. Sean is looking into this further too.

Code will begin concentrated efforts in January in the area bounded by Lipscomb to Fairmount, Morphy to Hawthorne.

Rahr Brewery took in \$250 in charitable contributions for Fairmount. We can ask to be the sponsored group on any available Saturday, and will be sure to be one just before Home Tour to sell tickets there.

Treasurer – Chewy – Checking - \$2,660.92 Savings - \$23,158.32 C.D. - \$15,238.52 TOTAL - \$41,057.76 Because new bank accounts were setup when officers were changed, old accounts have now been closed.

**Director of Historic Preservation** – Sue – find out more information about the parking lot at 8th and Myrtle, check landscaping, Architects next door have moved out. December Landmarks includes only 3 cases, new house at 1325 Fairmount, changes to 1001 Magnolia to become a brew pub, and continuance of 1329 Alston following mediation with owner. Working on setting up meeting with HP Staff to organize new Historic Survey of District to begin in January, and discussed two problem porch alteration cases.

**Director of Public Safety** – David – Code needs new volunteers, list of what to look for, streets assigned.

### Reports from Advisory Committee:

Fred – Suggested community outreach topics for newsletter, meetings, etc. Get block captains involved in identifying substandard houses, residents in need and hooking them up with Community Relations. Contact schools for help. Hold a food drive. Patti – Finally cut through the red tape with the City, needs permission from schools that do not have drug free/gun free signs – Fairmount will buy at \$28 each. Signs increase the penalty from misdemeanor to felony. Crime watch block signs going will be going up soon, NPO and Division Crime Prevention Specialist deciding where to locate them. Any signs in the neighborhood looking bad contact Patti to get them replaced.

Patti appointed to chair Committee to address potential TAD reform and to assist members with tax protests

### New and Pending Issues discussed:

New Fairmount neighborhood signage – Board to decide on the best 3 to present at January General Meeting for vote by members, contact submitters about colors. 710 W. Jessamine new bar and alcohol permit (across from a school) opposition petition containing 75 signatures was faxed to TABC.

Home Tour comparison to one in Dallas discussed.

Fairmount has been asked to take receivership and rehab 3 houses over the years, need to further explore eligibility, legal, and financial aspects. Sue to contact Jerre Tracy and Chris Mosley to setup a meeting with them to get the latest facts.

Sean passed on suggestion to form a coalition of Southside Neighborhood Associations – will speak to Keith Head of Ryan Place.

### SIGNAGE IN FAIRMOUNT IMPROVES SAFETY

Last year, we began working with the City of Fort Worth and the Fort Worth Independent School District to add Drug Free/Gun Zone Free signs at our neighborhood schools. The signs notify potential violators that their violation (carrying or possessing drugs or guns) within 1000 feet of a school elevates their violation from a misdemeanor to a felony.

Kristi Wiseman, Assistant to our City Councilman Joel Burns, worked tirelessly with us to cut through the red tape. Kristi understood the importance of the signs and was diligent and persistent in putting us in touch with the right people to make this happen.

Finally, after many months of stops and starts, our NPO Joel Stary contacted me and was able to give us the information we needed to 'get the ball rolling'.

Your Fairmount Neighborhood Association has now purchased the signs, and volunteers from our association will be installing the signs within the next few weeks. With permission of the principals at the schools, the signs will be installed at DeZavala Elementary, Daggett Montessori, and Daggett Elementary. (Daggett Middle School already has a sign.)

This one activity means that almost all of Fairmount will be included in the 1000 foot radius of the schools and will help tremendously as a deterrent to gun and drug activity.

At the same time, NPO Joel Stary offered to help us install additional Neighborhood Watch signs throughout Fairmount. Officer Stary told us that having these signs has proved to be a serious deterrent to crime in other areas. He and Ms. Eartha Pitre, our City's Central Division Crime Prevention Specialist, worked with us to determine good locations for the signs. These signs will be installed throughout the neighborhood within the next few months.

We are so grateful to these City staff who care about what we are trying to accomplish here in Fairmount. They work tirelessly and show their care and concern every day. When you see the Gun Free/Drug Free Zone signs, as well as the Neighborhood Watch signs, go up in our neighborhood, remember these good folks who have helped make it happen.

### **OUTSIDE YOUR OLD HOUSE**

It's hard to look at the snow —or the brown sticks in your garden under the gray sky and want to do anything at all in the garden. But there are a few things to do this time of year and here in Texas we usually have a few comparatively nice days to do them... first, take care of all your garden tools. Clean and sharpen the blades of all your shovels, hoes, picks and forks. Then give all the clean wooden handles a coat of linseed oil to keep them from getting dry and brittle. This is the time of year to prune your fruit trees and spray them with dormant oil. You can spray any time up to bud break. Now is also the time to fertilize. Use a high nitrogen fertilizer to improve bloom and fruit production. Marshall Grain carries a good one as does Mike's Garden Center. If you have grafted hybrid roses that are prone to black spot and other rose diseases and pests, a coating of dormant oil spray is beneficial to them also. Roses should be pruned now —up to 1/3 of the cane, removing the oldest or dead canes to encourage new growth. Prune to an outside bud so the bush has good air circulation. Sprinkle Epsom salts and earthworm casings around emerging daffodils and other spring bulbs. If your larkspur seedlings are showing, now is a good time to transplant or share the strays coming up where you don't want them. And if you plan to grow vegetables, now is the time to put in onions and carrots. You can start seed for lettuce and other cool w eather vegetables indoors or in your greenhouse. We should be ready to "rent" plots in the Community Garden soon (check elsew here in the new sletter for an update) so get ready. And last, but certainly not least, grab those garden catalogs and dream.... Happy gardening.

### Calling all gardeners!!!!

We hope it will be the first of many community gardens in our city as residents come together to learn and grow, plant and harvest,

to feed their families and others fresh vegetables grown in their very own garden plots.

We are so excited! Our garden will be located on 5th Avenue across from Fair mount Park. It should provide up to 50 individual or family 4 X



plots. Costs will be reasonable designed only to cover the cost of insurance, water and other operational expenses. In addition, a number of plots will be available for "sweat equity" and a children's garden is planned for young gardeners.

There is still a lot of w ork to be done: trees have to come down, brush and trash has to be cleared away, the ground has to be plowed, w ater lines installed, the driveway mulched and a fence built before the garden beds can be built. 



### HOW TO IDENTIFY A CENSUS FIELD REPRESENTATIVE

If a U.S. Census Bureau employee knocks on your door, here are some recognition tips to assure the validity of the field representative:

• The field representative must present an ID badge that contains: photograph of the field representative, Department of Commerce watermark, and expiration date.

- The field representative will provide you with supervisor contact information and/or the Regional Office phone number for verification, if asked.
- The field representative will provide you with a letter from the Census Bureau Director on official letterhead.
- The field representative may be carrying a laptop and/or bag with a Census Bureau logo.

### When Field Representatives will be Going Door-to-Door

- From April to July 2010, we will knock on the door of every household that does not mail back a completed 2010 Census form.
- We need your help it's critical that you take just 10 minutes to fill out and mail back your form rather than wait for
  a census worker to show up on your doorstep. About \$85 million in taxpayer dollars are saved for every one percent
  increase in mail response.
- The Census Bureau must get a census form to and a completed form back from every residence in the United States. That's more than 130 million addresses.

### What the 2010 Census DOES NOT Ask

• Field representatives will never ask you for your social security number, bank account number, or credit card number. Census workers also never solicit for donations and will never contact you by e-mail.

#### The Census is Safe

The 2010 Census will ask for name, gender, age, race, ethnicity, relationship, and whether you own or rent your home – just 10 simple questions that will take about 10 minutes to answer. Your answers are protected by law and are not shared with anyone.




