

MIKE McDermott to Present Fairmount Book at June Meeting

Fort Worth is called the city "where the west begins" and 100 years ago, the neighborhood known as Fairmount was where the south side ended. Now squarely in the heart of the city, the Fairmount Southside Historic District is actually numerous smaller subdivisions including the largest, the Fairmount Addition, and the two smallest. Chase Court and the dubiously named Swastika Place. The neighborhood was home to early merchants, lawyers, judges, artists, and small business owners—many of whom went on to local and even national fame. Today that legacy continues. Fairmount welcomes new generations of urban pioneers and benefits from a neighborhood renaissance that has brought this historically and

architecturally significant gem of the

city back from the brink of extinction. A native Texan and 44-year resident of Fort Worth, Michael McDermott has called Fairmount home for more than 25

years, having been one of the first of the new generation of urban pioneers. The restoration of his 103-year-old home gives testament to his love of all things historical and to his neighborhood, in which his own ancestors added to Fairmount's colorful stories. He



was one of the founders of the Fairmount Southside Historic District in 1990, and has served as liaison to the city as director of historic preservation. Michael collected many of the photographs from former and current Fairmount residents, county archives, library archives, private collectors and university collections. He even had to purchase many off the Internet.

At this month's meeting on Tuesday, June 22 at 7:00 pm, Michael will give a talk about the book, including a visual presentation, in the sanctuary at College Avenue Baptist Church, followed by reception, refreshments and book signing in the meeting hall. Books will be available at the meeting. If you are planning to buy a copy be-

fore the event, please wait as a portion of the proceeds from the sale of each book will be donated to the Fairmount Association. Please come join us and please tell interested neighbors who may not receive the newsletter to come join us as well.



PROPOSED SPECIAL-EVENTS ORDINANCE

The Fairmount Board of directors is currently following the proposed new Special-Events Ordinance city staff will propose to council on July 13. The need for this new ordinance originated with all the festival events downtown. Many business in the downtown area complain some street event take business away from the established restaurants. Unfortunately, the new regulations have been extended to include extreme regulation on just about any event the neighborhood association sponsors. Most impacted would be Fairmount Hoe Tour, parades, block parties.

Some of the extra burden that would fall upon the organizers would be: (1) 4 mailed notices to residence, business, and hospitals with 1/4 mile of an event. (2) 3 or 4 meetings per event with city staff. (4) extreme additional fees, insurance, and damage deposits for any event in a public owned area.

FAIRMOUNT RESIDENT PROPOSES PHILAN-THROPIC CHALLENGE FOR OPRAH WINFREY NETWORK

A Fairmount woman is taking her dream of a philanthropic reality television series to the Oprah Winfrey Network, and she's looking for neighborhood support to do it.

Mindy Audlin, her husband Shawn and daughter Jenna moved to Fairmount in May 2009. Mindy has recently submitted an audition video to Oprah's Search for the Next TV Star competition that shares her vision for a national service movement, where small groups representing churches, civic organizations, office teams, and family teams compete to "make the greatest impact" with specific challenges that serve their communities. By asking friends, family and neighbors to log on to the contest website and vote for her video, Audlin hopes to garner enough support to be named one of five online finalists for the competition.

"It's all about people helping people," Audlin said. "We would bring in celebrities to talk about their favorite causes, talk to the people whose lives are changed by these charities, and create challenges that teams across the nation could tackle together to help make a difference. It's really designed to be more than a television show. We're aiming to start a movement to address many of the urgent challenges facing our world today."

According to Winfrey's website, the five videos that receive the most online votes will be considered for a reality television competition series, along with semifinalists from four casting calls in New York, Los Angeles, Dallas and Atlanta. Participants will compete in a series of challenges, and the winner gets their own show on the Oprah Winfrey Network. The channel will debut in approximately 80 million homes on January 1, 2011 on what is now the Discovery Health Channel.

Audlin is currently the author of a new book, "What If It All Goes RIGHT? Creating a New World of Peace, Prosperity & Possibility" and works with church groups, corporate teams, and college students teaching techniques to develop a positive mindset while cultivating creativity and innovation.

"There is a huge need in our society today for social innovation," Audlin said. "The program aims to provide a collaborative platform for businesses, non-profits, and individuals to gather together for the common goal of serving humanity."

OUTSIDE YOUR OLD HOUSE

Have you heard the constant "scree, scree, scree" around your house lately? It's the sound of babies screaming "feeding time" to Mom and Dad on a nearly continual basis. The silly wren built her nest inside a small decorative watering can sitting in a basket hanging in my greenhouse! Trying to pot new plants and refresh old ones for the growing season was really a trick. If you have bird feeders they're probably emptying out more quickly at the moment as parents feed their offspring.

The Hummers are back so put out your feeder. Remember to change the nectar every four days or so. It ferments in this hot weather and that's not good for the birds. Add a water moat above it to keep out the ants too.

By now your spring blooms should be about done and your summer flowers should be starting: phlox, Monarda, daylilies, salvias, hydrangeas to name a few. Garden phlox likes good air circulation or it will develop dirty petticoats. Sometimes it will anyway. But the won-



derful

scent makes it well worth it! Phlox is one of those plants that likes cool roots so keep it well mulched as we go into summer. Most of your perennials—and annuals—will have a longer bloom time if you'll deadhead the spent blossoms. Last year my sweet potato vine developed flea beetles—this year it's brown stink bugs I'm seeing. Spinosad which is considered an organic has some success in controlling the beetles and an application of horticultural oil with a hose end sprayer will take care of stink bugs. Those stink bugs may show up on your melon plants also—along with the cucumber beetle which looks like a long version of a ladybug in green and black.

If you planted a bed in the Community Garden and it doesn't seem to be thriving, try adding some straight nitrogen fertilizer before each watering. Sprinkle it lightly as nitrogen can burn your plants and be sure to water it in well. The soil we used was 60% compost which is still breaking down. That process uses a lot of available nitrogen in the soil. We'll be bringing in a load of good mulch soon for mulching the beds. Mulch your beds at home too—except the iris. They don't like their corms covered and tend to sulk so it's best to keep them well drained.





Colorful butterflies, buzzing bees and singing birds are among the many visitors to this yard of the month. Our homeowners, Tom and Paula Simmons enjoy spending their evenings working in their yard, swinging on the front porch and visiting with their neighbors. They began work on the gardens five years ago, when at that time the only garden highlights were overgrown shrubs along the front porch.

Penny Simmons, daughter in law and designer for Great Expectations Design, drew up the plans for their cottage style garden to enhance their Craftsman home. They purchased the plants mostly from the




Southside Preservation Association Annual Plant Sale. The garden features mostly native Texas and heir-loom plants, and consists of Red Hot Pokers, Salvia, Variegated Sedum, Lantana, Maiden Grass, Dianthus, Daisies and Heirloom Roses. They lined the main bed with stones and added a Craftsman inspired trellis to the side bed. Located on a large corner lot, they have the diversity of both sun and shade plants and edit yearly with different varieties that catch their interests. They also have a vegetable garden and like to share the bounty with family and neighbors.

Tom restored the original tongue and groove front porch, adding Craftsman style railings and slate steps. From the street you can see several potted and hanging plants, and large pecan and maple trees. 
