

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OUTSIDE YOUR OLD HOUSE

It's that time of year when you can't garden fast enough! Between the planting, the deadheading and the trimming, your garden is growing faster than you can keep up with it. But, isn't

it gorgeous!? No wonder they sing that "June is bustin' out all over" song in Oklahoma.

I've been told I need to talk about fire ants that nasty black and red ant with a painful sting, raising a white pustule that is sore for days. It occurred to me that (knock on wood) we don't have fire ants in our yard although they seem to be found throughout the 'hood. Reading the literature Fred brought home with the beneficial nematodes, I real-



ized those critters were killing the ants as well as the grubs we put them down for. According to the directions, beneficial nematodes also kill fleas. Like most biological controls, nematodes aren't instantaneous so if you have an infestation of fire ants and small children or pets, you may want to use Amdro for a quicker control. Dry molasses sprinkled over the mound is also supposed to work though' I can't say I've ever tried it.

Most perennials will continue to bloom if you'll deadhead the spent blossoms. Dianthus, scabiosa (pincushion flower), phlox, coneflower, daisies can all have extended bloom times. Remontant roses will bloom until frost and will bloom better if you deadhead them. Leave the blossoms, however, if you want to use the hips. There are new varieties of both iris and daylilies that are reblooming and though they aren't "traditional" I enjoy both flowers enough to have some.

Have you enjoyed the red and white peonies that flourish in some Fairmount gardens? Me too. Peonies aren't particularly easy to grow in Texas because they like cold winters but it can be done. Try planting them in a slightly raised bed so they get the benefit of more cold as well as good drainage. It can take as long as three years to get your first blooms but with patience you'll have an outstanding show. Work some coffee grounds or other acidifier into the soil around the plant occasionally as they like a little more acid than our soils are naturally. You'll often see ants on the peony buds and the old wives tale is that they ate the nectar, helping the bud to open. They're unnecessary to that process but they don't hurt the flower. Just turn the bloom upside down in a pail of water to get rid of the ants if you want to cut the flowers.

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
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MEETING



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
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
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ANT CONTROL THE EASY WAY

Little black ants were invading my kitchen and I



used a natural remedy that worked. I mixed a little boric acid powder and honey and set it out on the counter where the ants were coming in. At first it got a lot worse but the ants were only around the lid with the mixture in it. Within a few

days they were all gone. It has been three weeks and they have not returned. Boric acid comes in a box and can be found in cleaning or detergent isle.

May 12, 2010 Board Meeting. Attending: Robert Wedding, John Murphy, Sue McLean, David Thrapp, Ricky Pike, Christen White, Sara Lynch, Micky Bradley

Home Tour - Christen and Sara

Proceeds estimates so far:

\$1700 silent auction; \$2400 online ticket sales; \$14,000 weekend ticket sales; ? antique mall still to be picked up; \$10,000 advertising and sponsorship; Less expenses

Ran out of books, but made more Sat night

Restaurants on Magnolia did well, some had 1 hour wait for lunch

Gas lease Renewals - David

Those who have 'option to renew' in their contract cannot be renegotiated.

Those who do not should be able to get all benefits of the Fairmount gas lease into their new contracts, but does not appear to be any chance of getting greater bonuses than offered.

Pawn Shops Made Legal-nonconforming issue - David

Neighborhoods were upset about this issue due to poor information from City. In 2006, 13 illegal pawn shops were made legal non-conforming – meaning if burns down cannot rebuild

Now those 13 need to go to the City to expand or remodel, and 2 mile limit between shops Joel has three pawn shops in District 9 all rampant with code violations and police calls = chronic crime area so declined to vote in favor – but it passed.

New Signage – Robert via Chewy

Some are mis-located, old ones not replaced or missing from designated locations – Robert is going to meet a guy from the City to relocate them rather than trying to explain.

Special Events Ordinance meeting - Robert

Special Events include neighborhood events like Home Tour, parades, National Night Out. Item 20-413 addresses Home Tour. Financially strapped City will need a new dept. Million dollar insurance policy would be required and notification of neighbors affected, applicants would have to attend 3 meetings to get on calendar and be approved with no conflicts, etc. Neighborhoods were given a tip on a cheap insurance plan to check out. They are trying to pass the ordinance now and fees later! June 7th 6:30pm – public hearing at Botanic Gardens – need public outcry against – wear Fairmount shirts

Membership house signs - Robert

Cost to be made would be \$10 – same cost for members to buy. Using new bungalow-cloud logo, but due to a member suggestion, Stacy is working on recreating an alternate design like the original using the Benton house – will be voted on by the membership. Will have a mock-up to show at meeting to take orders

Creation of Historic Preservation Taskforce - Robert

Purpose is to keep houses from getting to the point where they have to be demolished. Researching ownership, receiverships, aid programs, nuisance abatement, etc.

Growing need to buy or rent PC-projector – Ricky to look into price of buying VS renting, possibility of getting a sponsorship or grant to purchase.

May meeting will be fajitas provided by Code Blue and pot luck, no speaker

June meeting will be Mike McDermott speaking on his book to be out in June.

Public Art to be installed at Magnolia & Henderson – hoping to find a Fairmount resident to design

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
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YARD OF THE MONTH: 1936 WASHINGTON

The first flowers to arrive to arrive each spring in our yard of the month are the blooms on the Tea Cup Magnolia sharing space at the dining room windows with an Oak Leaf Hydrangea.

Small white butterflies cover the plants on this flowering garden. No grass here! Roses abound, both Knockouts and owner Becca Guttery's favorite—a gift from her daughter—the native Texas climber Mier Y Teran.

This yard has a multitude of four legged friends, namely, Baris, Natasha, and Marmalade, and we cold never forget Frank, but Sylvia is always in charge. You will see Sylvia hiding in the Lamb's Ear and Alyssium, under the White Bridal Wreaths, guarding the entranceway to the porch. The sidewalk is softened with last days of a winter's plantings: Ornamental Cabbages, Pansies,



and Kale. There is a multi colored arrangement of Stock holding the space for bushy Datura or Moonflower plants, Giant Elephant ears, and large orange Cannas that arrive each summer.

The stone walkways are planted with Creeping Thyme and Mondo Grass, always in a tug of war with Nutsedge. Peeking out from the Flowering Quince is a carpet of Blue Ajuga. Russian Sage and Rosemary on the north side of the walkway are joined by Lamb's Ear leading the way to the backyard.

Becca has lived in Fairmount for four years with her two indoor cats, Sophie and Scarlet, and her indoor/outdoor rescue, Sylvia.
