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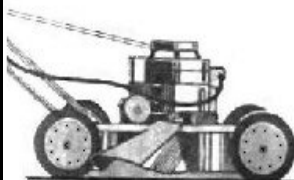

## YESTERYEAR IN FAIRMOUNT

From the January 16, 1911 Star-Telegram:

### WOMAN DRAGGED BY HAIR ALONG STREET

*Frantic Cries Cause Reports of Murder—*

*Police discover Drunken Pair*

*The sight of a buggy dashing down Fairmount avenue toward Myrtle street Sunday night at 11 o'clock with a woman dragging behind and held by the hair by a man in the buggy frightened pedestrians on the street, who thought the woman had been murdered and the police were notified at once.*

*Investigation resulted in the discovery that both the man and the woman were drunk and that the woman had been thrown over the back of the buggy by the man, who held to her hair and jerked her back into the buggy.*

*The occupants of the buggy were not identified and their destination could not be learned. Pedestrians on Myrtle street say the woman was in the buggy when it reached the thoroughfare and that she determined to in which she gave the man a verbal thrashing indicated that she was very much alive.*

Ninety-eight years later, Neighborhood Patrol Officer Ron Andriotto reports that hair-dragging incidents are down sharply. *Submitted by Stacy Luecker.*



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**APRIL YARD OF THE MONTH: 1328 SOUTH LAKE**

The lush and colorful landscape brightening the home of Bruce Samplly at 1328 South Lake Street is our choice for May's Yard of the Month.

A Cypress Tree anchors the middle of the Planting beds which wrap around two sides of the front yard, mirroring and enhancing the architecture of the house's wrap porch as well as its corner lot location. The river-rock lined beds are filled with a vibrant mixture of Ornamental Grasses, Rosemary and blooming perennials. The side street bed is anchored by a staked Wisteria and is filled with Rudbeckia, Guara and Phlox. The front facing beds blooms with masses of Knock-Out Roses, Day Lilies, Phlox and Iris.

A brick lined walkway leads to the front porch, which features brick covered step walls decorated with pots filled with a Variegated Asian Jasmine called salsa. More ornamental grasses and pink flowering Phlox fill the bed to the north of the porch. On the south side, at the rear of the house, Cross vines climb the privacy fence behind even more Day Lilies, Iris, Phlox and ornamental grasses.

**OUTSIDE YOUR OLD HOUSE**

I love this time of year when everything bursts into bloom. The gorgeous blooms, the sound of the birds, the smell of pansies and roses, jasmine and alyssum.

Sadly, Southside Preservation Hall isn't doing its Plant Sale this year. That makes it a little more difficult to find the annuals and perennials that will grow well here in Fairmount. Many of the beautiful plants you'll find at Lowe's and Home Depot aren't really well suited to our North Texas climate. On the other hand, there are some new cultivars out there that are big improvements to some of the heirloom plants we've grown for years. And there are some cultivation improvements too.

Are you starting from scratch? If you are, before you put in a garden bed on our lovely day soil, spend \$50, get a load of expanded shale and till it in. Together with compost, it is the best addition you can make to creating a loose loamy bed that will grow anything for you.

Are you working on an established garden? When your spring bloomers are done is the time to prune them back into shape. Old roses can be cut back by 1/3, giving them room to grow thru the rest of the season.

Some new cultivars worth trying: Profusion Zinnia, Superbells (Calibrochoa hybrid), Purple Pixie Loropetalum (fringe flower), Happy Returns daylily, many of the new grasses.

#### **Directors' Reports**

Asked other directors to send him their input on the benefits of being a member.
- Director of Finance – Chewy. Absent.
- Director of Administration – Serena. Needs to contact and get block captains together. Community garden has a temporary home at 1712 6th Ave. Working with Parks Department to secure a lease agreement to garden on the vacant lots on 1500 block of 5th Ave.
- Director of Historic Preservation – Sue. One case this month new construction 1800 Lipscomb. 1907 S Adams is appealing the March Landmarks decision to the Appeals Board in May. Tony Sims' church group wants to paint house for an indigent elderly person in Fairmount this fall. Keep an eye out for candidates to suggest.
- Director of Infrastructure – Robert. New street lights... no activity. Patti is calling on. Looking into Crime Control grant to fund signs around schools. The Crime Control signs are those that state the area around the school is a "Drug Free/Gun Free Zone". Violators are subject to felony charges, rather than misdemeanors. Joel Burns is working with Fairmount to get this accomplished.
- Director of Promotions – Jerry. Will not be at next meeting – need someone to volunteer to replace him.
- Director of Public Safety – David. Neighborhood wide cleanup reset for April 26th. Expecting about 75 households to sign up for the yard sale. Its spring, crime goes up. Don't park in street. Call in street lamp outages. Annual COP seminar/awards banquet coming up in May. Need to replace round tables.
- Director of Communication – John. Would like articles for newsletter. Needs Home Tour and Wine Down information for newsletter.
- President Emeritus - Fred. Fairmount is finalist in the National Neighborhood of the Year Association award for Home Tour! Looking into the possibility of sending Robert to present a presentation of Home Tour to the judging committee. Fred will keep putting together crime stats for the web site.

- Home Tour update: on schedule. Banners going up this week. Tickets are out to be sold. Info is up on web site. Poster is coming. Postcards should be done this week. No police department can function effectively without the assistance of responsible citizens. Officers depend on you to report suspicious persons or activities. Some people fail to call police because they don't recognize some activities as being suspicious. Others may observe suspicious persons but are hesitant to report them for fear of "causing trouble" or seeming to be a "nosy neighbor." Still other people assume that someone else will call the police. You should always call the police to report suspicious activity immediately. Don't feel embarrassed if your suspicions prove unfounded. Think about what might happen if you don't call. The police are ready to talk to you and appreciate your help.

Anything that seems even slightly "out of place" for a particular area or time of day can indicate possible criminal activity such as burglary, theft, or assault. Some obvious situations to watch for and report include:

- A scream heard anywhere.
- A stranger entering a neighbor's house when no one is home.
- The sound of breaking glass, gunshots, or loud, explosive noises.
- Anyone loitering around schools, parks, or secluded areas.
- Persons who do not live in the neighborhood loitering in the area.
- Anyone removing license plates, accessories, or gasoline from a car.
- Someone peering into a parked car.
- Persons entering or leaving a place of business when it is closed.
- Anyone selling merchandise at ridiculously low prices.

**THE NEIGHBORHOOD LIBRARY – OUR GRASS-ROOTS LIBRARY!**

When you talk to people who have been around the neighborhood for any amount of time, you will hear stories of people taking an idea and making it come true. This is the Fairmount way. We think big and we make it happen.

The same story is true of the Neighborhood Library. It was the brainchild of a few people in the neighborhood who are passionate about books and literacy. Our closest public library is downtown, which is too far away to walk to. These visionaries secured a space on W. Allen Avenue and began asking people to donate their gently used books. They had to work hard to turn the existing space into something that looked like a library, but on May 19, 2000, they opened their doors to the public. And the best part? The library has been sustained solely by individuals who are generous with their time and resources. The Neighborhood Library is not part of the City's Public Library system and it receives no tax payer funding. The library is grateful to Ralph Watterson of the Old Home Supply for his unwavering support.

The library is a true gem in our wonderful neighborhood. They have over 8,000 books and at last count, have over 2000 patron cards. They have books for every interest, and a fantastic children's section with a really cool reading nook. There are also many books available in Spanish. Computers with high-speed Internet are available to patrons free of charge. Additionally, yoga classes and Spanish classes are offered for nominal fees.

The Neighborhood Library is open Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays from 4:00pm to 8:00pm, and on Saturdays from 10:00am to 4:00pm. There is no fee to obtain a library card. Stop by soon and check it out.

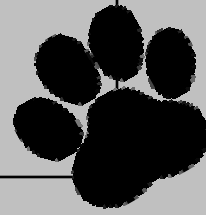
