Committee formed to rescue houses

For those of us who watched 1900 5th Ave. come down, the destruction of a venerable and once beautiful old Four Square through demolition by neglect was a terrible misapplication of justice.

While Fairmount certainly provides affordable housing close to work and entertainment for many, most of us live in old houses because we love the character and individuality they offer. The Fairmount Board determined that, where recovery was possible, another house in Fairmount would not be demolished by neglect and to that end set aside \$10,000. Additionally, they appointed a committee to create the necessary vehicle for recovery and find the financial partners to accomplish it.



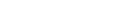






Garden Club

FNA Board Meeting Minutes Wednesday, Sept. 21, 2010

Present: Board: Stacy L, Sean L,

Sue M, Ricky P, Greg T, Jane W, Robert W Advisory Committee: Mickey B, Fred H

Call to order: 7:04

Discussion of receivership and related need to form a committee whose intent is to work with Category 1 and 2 property stabilization within the Fairmount Historic District. Discussion about forming a committee under the direction of Historic Preservation, but with its own director and members, and/or operation as a 501(c)3 organization. Purpose of committee would be to identify members/volunteers with specific skills related to stabilization/restoration, define all requirements related to selecting a property for stabilizing work, and to propose to the board those properties that meet defined selection requirements. Process of committee would be to select a property with stabilization potential, get approval from board to proceed, remove the property from the city's

demolition list, oversee its stabilization, then sell to a buyer who would complete the renovation of the property. Potential exists to partner with Historic Fort Worth or Fort Worth South to renovate and share profits of property sale. Initial stabilization funding would come from the FNA budget, and would be a fixed-cap revolving fund that allows for ongoing property acquisition efforts when the current stabilization project is completed (i.e. when a buyer purchases property for renovation). Due to the imminent demolition of 1405 Fairmount, that property was discussed as the initial project.

Need to emphasize the progressive nature of the FNA in terms of maintaining/restoring the historical quality of the neighborhood (the street lamp project as an example). Need to emphasize establishment of a working relationship with another entity whose goal is to preserve homes in the Fairmount Historic District. Need to emphasize the revolving nature of the funding wherein the FNA replenishes the initial funding

amount when the stabilized house is sold (goal is within one year of disbursement of initial funding). Need to highlight examples of renovated homes in the neighborhood via before/after pictures.

Discussion of funding amounts. \$10k was mentioned as a possibility, and can be verified when Robert W receives quotes for foundation and roof repair of 1405 Fairmount.

Motion 1 (Sean L) — motion to form the Fairmount Restoration Committee. Second – Ricky P. Passed unanimously.

Motion 2 (Jane W) — motion to create a budgetary line item for the purpose of stabilization of 1405 Fairmount, and to initiate a partnership with another entity like Ft Worth South or Historic Fort Worth to preserve homes in the Fairmount Historic District. Second — Greg T. Passed unanimously.

Reports From Directors: 7:15 - 7:30

Membership (Ricky): not present

- 1. Financial (Jane): not present. Chewy reviewed year end financial statements. Budget is in line with projections. We have a good cash balance, so the question is how to get funds back into the neighborhood. Suggestions are welcome. We are approximately \$14k under budget, of which \$11k was originally targeted for capital improvements but which has yet to be spent.
- Administration (Greg): volunteer for becoming a block captain and

for doing a presentation at the Interesting Fairmount Familiares portion of the meeting.

- Public Safety (Geri): October 2 is National Night Out. Please come out and join your neighbors. Fort Worth police are actively asking people to get their car windows etched with the car's VIN. It is a great way to discourage theft of windows (or cars whose windows are profitably sold as parts).
- Infrastructure (Sean): not present. Robert reminded group that the FNA has adopted Allen Ave., and that the next cleanup will be in October. October 20 social hour will be at Butler Antiques.
- Communications (Stacy): The newsletter thrives on input from members please send information. Reminder to watch the website for information as well.
- Historic Preservation (Sue): Landmarks Commission met and approved two garages and window additions to neighborhood homes. A brick home on Henderson was painted, resulting in a Commission denial until options for removing the paint could be explored. It was noted that guidelines do not allow unpainted brick to be painted (previously painted brick can be repainted.)

Presentations: 7:30 – 8:05

Patti Randle: food drive kickoff was discussed. There are four locations in the neighborhood at which to drop off donated food: Old Neighborhood Grill, Old Home Supply, Finn McCool's, 1208 W Magnolia Building. Interesting food facts: the primary meal of 225,000 children in the area served by the Tarrant Food Bank is a subsidized meal; 43 percent of the people who receive food are children; 18,000 senior citizens must make a daily choice between food and medicine.

Brenda Howell was introduced as the new Director of Promotions

Robert Wedding "Future of Fairmount" presentation asked what do we lose whenever a house is allowed to get run down or when it is demolished? It is possible to lose historic status if too many homes are demolished and replaced with new construction. Given that we own our neighborhood, we have done many things to preserve and enhance it, such as our streetlight installation and street sign activity. Robert proposed that the time has come to move to a new level of preservation activity by founding and funding of the Fairmount Restoration Committee. This committee would work to save neighborhood properties categorized by the city as Category 1 (properties designated for demolition within six months). The committee would find partners such as Ft Worth South, Historic Ft Worth or Historic Southside who would wish to work with us to find a suitable property capable of being stabilized. Once stabilized, the property would be sold to an individual who would restore the property. The proceeds of this sale would replenish a revolving fund, and the process would start over again - allowing another property to be stabilized. As the FNA cannot possibly fund an entire stabilization project, it was proposed to allocate \$10k for the purpose of stabilizing 1405 Fairmount.

The committee needs volunteers with legal expertise, contracting expertise, and construction expertise. Susan Harper is heading the Fairmount Restoration Committee, and should be contacted if you are interested in helping.

Motion to allocate \$10k for the purpose of establishing the Fairmount Restoration Committee and to establish a revolving fund to stabilize historic properties was made by Steve Cocanower, second by Fred Harper. Passed by majority.

First Presbyterian still looking for advocacy for their proposal to create an outreach ministry on Hemphill. Board voiced concern over increased foot traffic in the neighborhood, and suggested that a location east of I-35 would actually serve the constituents better.

Still looking for a Spanish speaking community liaison to work with home owners in the area to improve their homes.





Fairmount receives landmark decision

Do you have a wood porch floor that keeps rotting away, and you are sick and tired of looking at it? Or do you keep replacing it, painting the wood on all sides beforehand, or even using wood preserver on it and it still rots?

Our current Fairmount District guidelines state that porch floor replacement must be in-kind. Therefore, a tongue and groove wood porch floor needs to be replaced with new tongue and groove wood (and they don't make wood like they used to). It must not be decked with treated lumber, not covered in plywood and painted, nor changed to concrete.

Our proposed revised historic guidelines, (which our guidelines committee has been working on for two years now, and will soon be submitted for approval,) will allow a product of exceptional quality that gives the same appearance as wood to be used for contributing and non-contributing properties on a case by case basis for replacement of wood tongue and groove porches.

Consultation with the Fairmount Historic Preservation Committee to be sure the product is of high quality and that it will be installed correctly will be required. This means it must be installed invisibly with a floor-nailer, not with screws from the top, and end-capping pieces must be installed to conceal the grooves in the board ends that would reveal that it is not real wood. Also, corners must be mitered like real wood porches, not butted one side to the other.

On Oct. 11, the Fort Worth Historic and Cultural Landmarks Commission helped speed things along when they approved a new product called Aeratis PVC Porch Flooring to replace historic wood porch flooring on one of our

historic Fairmount homes, per our recommendation and that of the planning staff.

Based on company testimonials, the product has been used on at least two National Register properties, one being Oak Alley Plantation in Louisiana, which has not affected the National Register status of either property.

For more information, see the website at www.aeratis.com/pdf/Aeratis_Sales_Sheet_2008.pdf. There is also a rebate available at www.aeratis.com/buckaboard.

Averaging \$12 per square foot, this product is not cheap. But with its 20 year warranty, look at the money and aggravation you will save by not replacing your porch flooring year after year.

If you want to install it, the product is available at Teague Lumber, 2501 White Settlement Road. You will need

both a construction permit and a Certificate of Appropriateness from the city. Contact Jamie Zwolak at the Planning Department at City Hall or call him at 817.392.8037 for more information on the process.

Many thanks to Bruce Sampley, Ken Albee of Teague Lumber, and installer Kyle Cole of Cole Construction and Remodeling (405.808.5151) for bringing this product to our attention a few months ago, and to Karen Keller for biting the bullet and being our test case with the Landmarks Commission.

You are welcome to check out how the new porch flooring looks on Bruce's front porch at 1328 S. Lake. His porch floor was administratively approved by staff a few months ago because the house is new construction and noncontributing.

Outside Your Old House by Susan Harper

At long last it's cool enough to trigger the gardening bug again. And there is certainly a lot to do in the fall garden before the leaves start falling in earnest.

If you have roses you'd like to propagate for yourself or someone else, this is the time of year to do it. Make a cut just above an outward facing bud, divide the stem if you'd like, dampen the ends and dip them in rooting powder and plant them in a potting soil filled pot. Keep the soil moist but not wet. The pot can be left outside until the first freeze.

Now is also the time to divide your spring blooming perennials: coneflower, Liatris, columbine, oxalis, violets, turk's cap, phlox, lantana and daylilies are just a few.

Foliar feeding of your garden beds can continue until frost. I like Medina Plus but seaweed and fish emulsion also work well.

Check your established plants for spider mites due to our really stressful summer. If you find them, try a shot of water from your hose. If they return, horticultural oil in your hose end

sprayer will take care of the little buggers.

There is still time to plant fall vegetable crops: all the lettuces and cabbages, broccoli and brussel sprouts, carrots and parsnips as well as the fall squashes. While you're out doing that, dig up your lemongrass. Cut off the tops for cooking and store the bulbs, wrapped in newspaper in a cool place, for next spring.

Fall is considered the best time of the

year to plant trees and shrubs. And, of course, the cream of the pansy crop should begin to show up in the nurseries any moment if they haven't already, along with the new crop of Dianthus and alyssum.

And when you've finished playing in your garden, have a seat on your front porch, invite your neighbors for a glass of wine and enjoy the fruits of your labors.

This selection for Yard of the Month began as an effort to distract visitors away from a crumbling parkway and has blossomed into a lush gardener's showcase in just under two years.

Sophie Priolo and Jarrod Holt, Fairmount residents of four years, undertook the project with the aim of creating a pair of full-bodied flower beds that could dress up the home's curb appeal while focusing on low-maintenance species that would be friendly to the hot Texas summers.

They began by enlisting Jarrod's mother, Patti, a Ryan Place resident, who drew on her years of gardening experience to lay the initial groundwork and select the original species. Unbroken rows of rosemary, red yucca and purple skullcaps make up the bulk of the planting design and mediate the space between the short yard and deep front porch. Expanding on this design, Jarrod, a graphic designer (designer of the new Fairmount neighborhood signs and street name toppers), added vibrant red Turk's Cap to the mix and laid down a cottage style brick path along the front. When helping out at his family's local bar, Finn MacCool's Pub, he now finds himself frequently trading landscaping tips with other gardeners.

Sophie, a realtor with Amaya Realty Group of RE/MAX Trinity, maintains the welcoming clusters of planted growth at the entry steps, including purple heart, mums, dusty miller and snow princesses among others. Also a talent in the kitchen, she cooks with her own herbs, pulling from planted mint, fennel, cilantro, a giant basil plant and of course, rosemary.

Having now embraced their newfound affinity for gardening, the couple continues to make seasonal changes, but is always taking care to create a welcoming presentation for both guest and passerby, as well as providing a shady haven for their two cats, Fred and Ginger.

Tips break code to report offenses online

While I find Fort Worth's city website to be very informative, it's sometimes a challenge to find some of the more useful sites – like Code Compliance. It seems you never can find it when you are hearing the constant barking from two doors down or see the car parked in the front yard or the yard that would be useful for jungle training.

For your Fairmount toolkit, keep this handy:

To submit a code complaint:

http://www.fortworthgov.org/codecompliance/

Click on Submit a Complaint

Click on Enter CodeOps

Go through the steps:

1. Enter the address or block of the



location of the violation (if it's on a corner lot, add the cross street);

- 2. Pick the type of violation (the violation type will highlight/change colors when you select it);
- 3. I always enter a brief description, even if its redundant;
- 4. Contact information is optional. I always enter it, but select the "No" option when it asks if you want to be a witness because it keeps my information private. (however,

- when the violation is flagrant and repeated, I'll pick "Yes").
- 5. The last screen will give you the Code violation number so you can track the progress of the complaint.

Remember that one of the purposes of the website is to make it easy for the code compliance officer. If you run into one of those lots or houses that doesn't have an address, put in the block number and add something like "it's the fourth house (or lot) from the corner of 5th Avenue and W. Jessamine on the west side of the street" in the description block.

It's simple, easy, fast and a great way to help the neighborhood.

You might note that the main website has lots of other useful sites for city services that you'll want to check out.



well. Susan, founder of Fairmount's Community Garden and local landscape designer, was featuring a collection of plants beautifully arranged into old watering cans and vintage vessels. And, I'm a member of Fort Worth South, so it was just natural for me to come out tonight and do this!"



Benton House, c.1898. Meredith A. Benton, a native of Vermont, was an executive with the Lorilllard Tobacco Co. who traveled extensively in North Texas and the Oklahoma Territory. He moved to Fort Worth with his wife, Ella Belle, around 1898 and took possession of this house, built under the supervision of his father, Willam A. Benton, a contractor from Kansas City. The house is a fine model of a Victorian residence with wraparound porch supported by lathed posts and ornamental brackets, decorative shingles and intricate gable braces. It is still owned by descendants of Meredith and Ella Belle Benton, who remember that as children they could sit on the front porch and see the county courthouse downtown. The house received a Texas historic building medallion in 1971.





Harvest Loaf Cake
(Pumpkin Bread)

1 3/4 c flour

1/2 c butter

1 t soda

1 c sugar

1 t cinnamon

2 eggs

1/2 t nutmeg

3/4 c canned or cooked pumpkin

1/4 t each ginger and ground cloves

3/4 c chopped walnuts

3/4 c chocolate chips

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Grease loaf pan.

Combine flour, soda, and spices. Cream butter and sugar together in large bowl; add eggs and blend well. At low speed on mixer, add dry ingredients alternately with pumpkin, beginning and ending with dry ingredients. Stir in chocolate chips and nuts. Turn into prepared pan. Sprinkle with remaining 1/4 c. walnuts.

Bake at 350 degrees for 50-75 minutes. Cool. Drizzle with glaze. Let stand 6 hours before cutting.

Spice glaze

Combine 1/2 c. sifted confectioner's sugar, 1/8 t each nutmeg and cinnamon. Blend in 1-2 Tablespoons of cream until it is the consistency of a glaze.

WOMAN DRAGGED BY HAIR ALONG STREET

The occupants of the burgy were not identified and their destination could not be learned. Pedestrians on Myrtle street say that the woman was in the buggy when it reached the thoroughfare and that the determined tone in which she gave the man a verbal thrashing indicated that she was very much alive.
